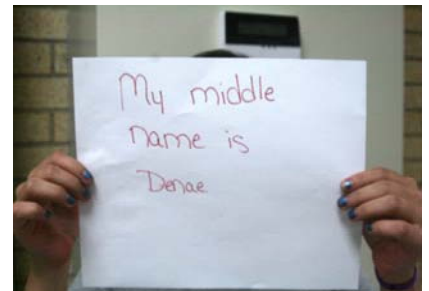
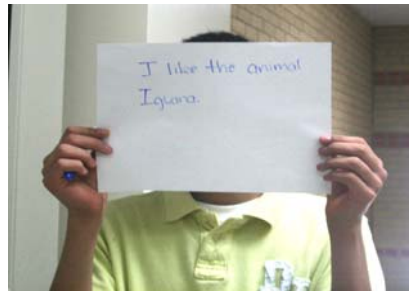
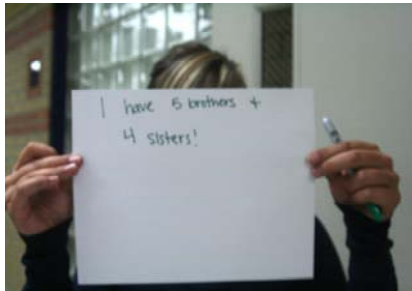

Kansas Schools Avoiding H1N1

In June 2009, the World Health Organization declared that a pandemic—a global epidemic—had begun concerning H1N1, also known as the swine flu. It has been affecting those from six through twenty one years of age. This is not typical of the normal flu which usually affects the very young and the elderly. With more than one fifth of that particular age group attending school, there are more policies and procedures that we have to follow.

The state of Kansas has recommended several things for schools to adopt: Parent and administrator letters, hand washing techniques, ("Elmo Hand Washing" video available) to show students how to wash their hands, sick rooms, the "Dracula" sneeze or cough technique, and no sharing water bottles. The state of Kansas also advise parents to keep children at home twenty four-hours fever free-without the use of fever reducing medication. The H1N1 vaccine will be distributed soon through the Cherokee County Health Department.

The symptoms of H1N1 are similar to the usual flu. This includes: fever, coughing, sneezing, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headaches, chills and fatigue. (continued)

Kansas Schools Avoiding H1N1 Cont...

We advise that a child stays home if they have any of these symptoms. Also, if the fever is at least one hundred degrees or higher, we will send them home if they are already at school. Fortunately, most cases have been mild and only last for a few days. However there have been severe cases that either led to hospitalization or death.

Galena Schools have taken the recommendations of the state to help limit the spread of the virus. Several precautions, such as extra sanitizer were placed in high traffic areas. Hand washing techniques were taught to all children at the elementary level. The superintendent, Brian Smith, has attended two state wide meetings about the virus. The school nurse, Amy Price, receives updates daily on new information from the Cherokee County Health Department. Students, parents, and staff have been made aware of the new procedures and are implementing them as part of the school routine.

Limiting the spread of flu in schools during a pandemic requires a new perspective. We need to expect the unexpected. Parents, teachers and administrators need to work hard to keep schools open and be ready if schools suddenly close down. Students and staff shouldn't have to worry about absences or missing out on school. Above all, we need to expect quick change if necessary. Together, we can slow down the spread of H1N1 throughout Kansas.

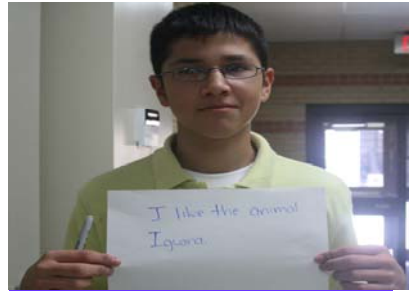

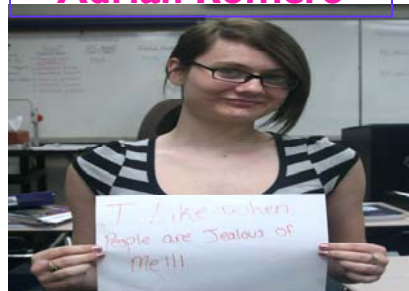

Pittsburg State University (PSU)

If you are thinking about attending Pittsburg State University there are some things you need to think about, such as the academic requirements and the cost of attending PSU. Also you need to start thinking about what you want your major to be. Some of the academic requirements to enroll in PSU are: you must have an ACT score of 21 or higher, you must rank in the top 1/3 of your high school graduating class, or you must complete the pre-college curriculum with at least a 2.0 GPA. The pre-college curriculum includes: four units of English, three units of math, three units of Natural Science, and three units of Social Science. You can also have 24 or more transferable college credit hours with at least a 2.0 to 4.0 GPA grade point average.

The costs for PSU include full fees and tuition, books and supplies, and residence halls. The current cost for one academic year is \$11,236 for students living in the State of Kansas and \$19,760 for students living out of the state. These amounts include the annual cost for a room in the residence halls of \$5,744 which is the same for students living in Kansas and for students that do not live in the state of Kansas. Advantages of residence hall living: less expensive than off-campus housing; within walking distance of classes and on-campus activities; cable T.V. and mini refrigerator, no utilities; no lease; no cooking or grocery shopping.

Pitt State offers a lot of different majors in Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, and Technology. Some of the different majors for the College of Arts and Sciences include: Art, Biology, Chemistry, Communication, English, and Family and Consumer Sciences. They also offer majors in History, Mathematics, Modern Languages and Literatures, Music, Nursing, Physics, and Social Sciences. Some of the majors in College of Business include: Accounting, Computer Science/Information Systems, Economics, Finance, and Banking. Majors offered in Education include Curriculum and Instruction, Psychology and Counseling, and Special Services and Leadership. Pitt State offers majors in Technology which include: Automotive Technology, Construction Management and Construction Engineering Technology, Graphics and Imaging Technologies, and also Technology and Workforce Learning. There are so many majors offered at Pitt State that there is something for almost anybody.

Students that qualify and live in certain Missouri or Oklahoma counties will be able to pay in-state tuition at PSU. Check with the university to see if you qualify. Pitt State offers scholarships and federal financial aid for students that want to attend the University. For a scholarship to attend Pittsburg State you can visit www.pittstate.edu/scholarships before February first. (continued)

You can also receive private scholarships. To receive federal financial aid you can fill out the free application for federal student aid after January first.

Pittsburg State offers a coffee shop and snack bar called the Axe Grind. Also a dining facility called the Gibson Dining Hall, also a food court called the Gorilla Crossing. Pittsburg State also offers a University Club that offers a variety of foods and beverages, and a KTC Café. Pitt State offers sports that include Baseball, Basketball, Cross Country, Track and Field, Football, Golf, Volleyball, and Softball. Pittsburg State offers more than one hundred academic programs and more than one hundred fifty clubs and organizations.
